Looking Back: Reflections on the 2023 Annual Study Conference



The Conference met virtually on June 15-16. The theme was Chaplaincy Education for the 21st Century: Exploring Creative Collaboration.

Our Conference speakers, Dr. Shelly Rambo and Dr. Carrie Doehring, addressed the recent publication: Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care in the 21st Century. We had five panel respondents who spoke from different chaplaincy related contexts: Duane Bidwell, Leenah Safi, Dagmar Grefe, K. Monet Rice-Jalloh, and Maureen Shelton. The Conference aimed at infusing the sustained dialogue between theological educators and institutions, clinical pastoral education programs, and chaplains in varied contexts. Our workshops also explored theological education in relation to the competencies needed for chaplaincy. Jan Holton and Jill Snodgrass presented their continuing work on "Theoretical and Theological Reframing of Trauma" as a work-in-progress.

The Pre-Conference for Scholars of Color had a panel discussion with Dr. Danielle Buhuro, Rev. Sunghee Han, and Rev. Carol Lakota Easton on the theme of "Cultural Diversity Matters: Postcolonial Images and Practices in Chaplaincy."

The study groups (Religious Practices and Pastoral Research; Postcolonialism, Globalization and Pastoral Care Study Group; Eco-Anxiety and Climate Change Special Interest Group; and Embodiment) continued their collaborative reflection and conversation.

Qur next Study Conference will be from June 4-7, 2024 as we meet, in person, at New Brunswick Theological Seminary (New Brunswick, New Jersey). We are grateful for Dr. Raynard Smith of NBTS brokering this possibility for us. The decision to have a seminary as a host site follows Society conversations the past years and being stewards with the Society's finances. The conference theme is: Intersectional Care in a Divided World: Courage, Resistance, and Hope.

We are witnesses to a perilous and precarious world. Wealth discrepancies, post-pandemic loss and malaise, socio-political injustices, polarized communities, and the desire to control human bodies are among the societal forces fueling the turmoil. A looming climate crisis intensifies the world's predicament. Too many people experience loneliness, anxiety, fear, trauma, and despair as they long for societal justice, belonging, and flourishing. They empower persons and communities to grow in resistance and resilience, in purpose and hope. The 2024 Society for Pastoral Theology Annual Meeting aims at quickening the exposing, Society's recognized history of challenging, and resisting the powers that render us vulnerable and disempowered. Courageous conversations, just care, and community-building across differences are required. We can be(come) a compassionate, caring people. Join us in this charge

Call for Proposals

The Steering Committee invites members to submit proposals for workshops by January 15, 2024. We encourage proposals that address the conference theme of just care in a perilous and precarious world.

We strongly encourage new scholars or others working on a research project for which they might want input to submit proposals for the works-in-progress by January 15, 2024.

Proposal Guidelines

Proposals should not exceed two pages (1.5 spacing). It should include an abstract; provide a brief description of theoretical foundations and/or contributions; identify the intended audience (clinicians, chaplains, pastors, or academics, for example); and, workshop format. Proposals should be submitted as a PDF.

Proposals for workshops and works-in-progress should be emailed to Jaco Hamman, corresponding secretary (jaco.hamman@vanderbilt.edu).

Study Groups

The Steering Committee invites proposals for the formation of new study groups.

A study group will have two or more sponsors. The proposal should include a description and a brief discussion of the proposed group's significance for the Society for Pastoral Theology. Examples of new study groups might be: Teaching the Introduction to Spiritual/Pastoral Care; Care in a Political World; Care and Algorithms; Beyond Trauma; Gender Spiritual Care; Brain Science; and Interreligious Pastoral Care; Care of Families; Chaplaincy, etc. The 2024 Annual Study Conference can host a total of six study groups.
